FROM THE PRINCIPAL

As the HSC examinations have finished I would like to congratulate our students on their application to their studies and the manner in which they conducted themselves throughout the exams. The supervisors made special comment about our students in relation to their manners and the respect they were shown. This would not come as a surprise to our school community as one of our core values is respect and one which our students demonstrate on a daily basis. The Year 12 Formal is on November 10 where we will celebrate the student's academic achievements and officially farewell them. As Year Advisor, Kim Wills has been an amazing support for the students and worked tirelessly to ensure they have been supported throughout their time at school.

The new Year 12 cohort have started their HSC studies this term. It is important they keep on top of their workload and complete all assessment tasks which must be handed in on the due date. Any task not handed in on the due date is awarded a zero mark unless there is a medical certificate supplied. This is the Board of Studies ruling. Students are encouraged to make use of the Learning Hub which is available to all students on a Monday and Wednesday afternoon from 3.00-4.30 pm to support the completion of classwork and assessment tasks and to utilise the support of teachers in any area they are experiencing difficulty.

Our school has hosted two fabulous community events this term. Our car boot sale was a fabulous morning and despite the rain was well attended. Our Grandparent's Day was also popular and provided an opportunity for us to recognise the role grandparents play in the lives of our families and our school.

In the coming weeks we will see the Year 6 students from our local primary schools visiting as part of their Orientation Program. For most students starting high school is an exciting phase of a young person's growth and for others can be quite a daunting experience. We aim to provide an environment which is safe and supportive for all our students. Any parent or student who may be anxious should contact the school and speak with Mrs Steuart or Mrs McIntosh.

During Week 7, our Year 7 students will be undertaking their interviews for Authentic Assessment. Year 10 will do theirs in Week 8. This is a program we will roll out across all year groups next year. The purpose is for students to speak to a panel about the learning they have undertaken during the year. It provides a framework for students to reflect on their learning and to gain confidence in speaking to a panel about what they did well and what they might have done differently given the feedback received from their teacher. Students choose the work for their presentation to show their learning. This means they do not always choose their best work with the highest mark.

Students were issued with an Assessment Book which outlines all rules and regulations surrounding assessment at Francis Greenway for senior students. There are also copies of assessment schedules for each Year 12 course, including dates and type of task. Students will be notified of any changes made to these documents and will sign off on this where necessary.

Copies of the 2017 Rules and Procedures Booklet from BOSTES were also given to students. Please check that students have these very important documents and take the time to read through them so that you are also informed of what the school and BOSTES require in terms of assessment and attendance during your child's HSC year.

Please remember that this year can be a stressful time for students. Prioritising events around school and assessable tasks is very important, as is ensuring adequate time for relaxation and recreation.

Consistent study should be undertaken (2-3 hours minimum per night) that includes reviewing notes taken in class on any given day.

Work commitments and holidays need to be considered carefully as these are not considered a reason to be absent or reasonable application for misadventure.

CAREERS AND VET



Mrs Dempsey is available for **Year 12** students and their parents to discuss post school applications and pathways.

Year 11 students and Year 10 leavers need to register with Mrs Dempsey, if they wish to do the on-line RoSA Literacy and Numeracy tests. They must put their name on the booking sheet at the careers office. The exams will be held at school before the end of school term. These exams take 2 hours and are multiple-choice. They are held in sport time in the Library, so that classes are not missed. Previously students have been very pleased with their results. This is a great report to present to employers.

Many opportunities are available to all students and advertised to students through roll call announcements or through their school email. Students need to be checking their school email accounts regularly so as not to miss out on these events.

Year 10 are being offered another week of work experience in week 9, week commencing December 5. The students must find an employer first, then come and collect the paperwork from the careers office in the Library. The paperwork has changed considerably, with extra detail needed from the employer and parents.

Year 10 also will be participating in 3 events during weeks 7 and 8. They include "Authentic Assessment" (week 8). Each student will present and discuss their assessment tasks and present a resume. Students will also be doing a Work Ready course and a Personal Presentation course before these interviews (week 7). Notes will be coming home about this.

Year 10 will also be given the opportunity to apply for their Unique Student Identifier (USI). They will need to bring either copies of their Birth Certificate, Passport, Medicare Card or Driver's Licence to school and we will assist them with this process. Some students did this earlier in the year when doing the WHS (white card) course and

will need to supply this to the school for VET courses in Year 11.

Hopefully we can complete this process by the end of this year and students can start Year 11 2017 with all the necessary paperwork completed.

Year 10 will also need to complete an online course called HSC: "All My Own Work" before commencing Year 11 2017. This course **is compulsory** and includes information about plagiarism, referencing and how to quote other authors.

When you register on JobJump you will receive the News on the Careers your son/daughter likes sent to your home email address. Plus you will be able to use all parts of the JobJump website to help them plan and achieve their Career dreams. It is there to help all the way through to an extra year after their Year 12.

To register with JobJump, go to the front screen of the website at www.jobjump.com.au

Click on I'm New. On the new screen, enter into the first white box the first letters of your school's name and when the full name appears just below in blue, click on your blue school name and it will enter automatically into the first white box.

In the second white box, enter your school password which is:

and click Continue. You then need to enter a few details and set your Personal Password. (Min 6 characters).

So whenever you then come back to Login to JobJump, all you will then need is your email address and Personal Password.

Two things to remember:

If you can't find the career from the list offered that suits your son/daughter, select a career which is in the field they like. For example, they may like the field of Tourism and the idea of having a career in the Tourism industry is not a bad idea. In the listing select 'Travel Agent' because all Tourism careers news will come to you.

When you register, remember you can select as many careers as you like from the listing. If your son/daughter changes their mind you can alter the choices at any time by going to the black head at the top right hand side after you are Logged In.

JUNIOR AECG REPORT

FGHS has had a Junior AECG for many years. AECG stands for Aboriginal Education Consultative Group and it's members are from Years 7 – 10. The purpose of the Junior AECG is to communicate business arising and to give Aboriginal students a voice in school issues. The group meets once every month with an agenda compiled by it's executive members. Most Junior AECG members also participate in the "Write it Right" program.

Firstly, the Junior AECG would like to thank Debby Elliot, the President of the Maitland Local AECG. She attended our meeting in August so she could learn about what we are doing at the FGHS Junior AECG and so she can tell other schools how successful we are. She discussed the recent Connecting to Country course attended by staff from FGHS.

At our last meeting we discussed a number of items. It was decided that Write it Right members would collaboratively write reports for the FGHS Gazette. We also proposed a leadership award to be created to identify Aboriginal students who are excelling in Years 7 – 10. There has been discussion around the award and how it would be symbolised and around where the award would be placed and what it would physically look like. We currently have two options for this award and when we hold the final meeting at the end of the term to elect members for 2017, we will vote on this as an entire group.

A new incentive for 2017 was proposed as part of the last meeting's general business. We hope to run a leadership course for the Junior AECG Executive members and up to eight other members. The purpose of the course is to provide leadership and communication skills to attendees. This will enhance the leadership capabilities already demonstrated by the President, Vice President, Secretary and Vice Secretary. It will also allow Junior AECG meetings to be modelled on the Local AECG meeting.

An initiative we have been evolving this year is to include our partner primary schools in each meeting we hold. On the morning of our meetings in week 3 and week 7 each term, Miss Brazel and Mrs McIntosh have been driving to the primary schools in our school bus to include the year 6 students in the formalities. This allows the students an extra transition opportunity as well as clearly demonstrating the objective of the Junior AECG and how they can be an active leader at FGHS.

Miss Attwill facilitates meetings and has generously supplied her time freely and enthusiastically for many years to ensure the continuation of the Junior AECG at FGHS. We sincerely thank her.

The next meeting of the FGHS Junior AECG will in week 7 where we will hold elections for the 2017 Junior AECG.



Strategy = seeking help, good for kids who experience alleged bullying and social problems

5. I know it looks bad now but you will get through this

Strategy = offering hope, good for kids who experience loss, change or extreme disappointment

6. What can you learn from this so it doesn't happen next time?

Strategy = positive reframing, good for kids who make mistakes, let others down or experience personal disappointment

7. Don't worry - relax and see what happens

Strategy = acceptance, good for kids who worry about exams or performing or who are pessimists

8. This isn't the end of the world

Strategy = maintaining perspective, good for kids who catastrophise or blow things out of proportion

9. You could be right. But have you thought about......

Strategy = flexible thinking, good for kids who catastrophise, exaggerate or experience extreme feelings

10. What can we do about this?

Strategy = taking action, good for kids who mope, experience disappointment or who feel inadequate

Mathematics ICAS Competition

The 2016 ICAS Mathematics was held in August. For over 22 years ICAS has taken place each year in schools throughout Australia, New Zealand, Singapore, Malaysia, Brunei, the Pacific region and South Africa. ICAS provides an opportunity for all Years 7 – 12 students to gain a measure of their own achievement in an external testing situation. All students receive a certificate and an individual student report indicating which questions they answered correctly and their score compared with the rest of the students tested. This year, Year

Why HSC Mathematics and Science are essential for the future.

HSC: Even if your child doesn't intend to pursue a career in STEM, it's important to understand the role technology has and will have in transforming their chosen industry.

With 2.5 quintillion bytes of data being created every day, it is increasingly important for university graduates across all industries to be experienced in analysing and interpreting data, and those without solid foundations in mathematics and science may struggle.

Concerningly, the percentage of students in NSW not studying any mathematics in their final school years has trebled since 2001. With many Year 10 students having selected or in the process of selecting their subjects for the Higher School Certificate, it is important for parents and students to consider the impact of skipping mathematics or science on future aspirations.

We know that 75 per cent of the fastest-growing occupations now require STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) skills, so having good foundations in mathematics and science are valuable (if not essential) attributes of successful graduates today.

If your child is considering dropping mathematics or science ahead of the HSC, take a moment to research and discuss what impact it might have on their future options. Even if your child doesn't intend to pursue a career in STEM, it's important to understand the role technology has and will have in transforming their chosen industry.

According to the University of Technology, Sydney, even an area such as journalism will require transformational skills in coding, audience metrics and deep data analysis in the future. HSC mathematics and science subjects teach skills beyond the course content; they help students develop analytical, problem-solving and critical-thinking skills, which are needed at university and in their future workplaces.

The importance of mathematics is also demonstrated by the recent move by the NSW Government to announce it is implementing a compulsory NAPLAN benchmark in literacy and numeracy by 2020 for eligibility for the HSC.

When students choose their HSC subjects, they may pick subjects with a career or industry in mind. Some students may want to choose the same subjects as their friends, or because a particular teacher is taking the subject. If your child already has an idea of what career they wish to pursue, they are likely to select subjects that are particularly relevant to that area.

Universities often list assumed and recommend HSC subjects for their courses, so check these have been included in their HSC subject selection. If your child doesn't yet have a particular career in mind, or are likely to change their ideas several times, encourage them to do some research and keep their options open.

Start with the school's career adviser, use the government's Job Outlook career quiz, encourage them to speak to family friends who work in different industries and consider organising work experience in areas which they find appealing.


Many schools offer work experience programs which can help students understand what a particular industry or workplace may have to offer. As a parent, you play an important role in encouraging your child to take an analytical approach, conducting research and ensuring they have strong groundings in mathematics and science in particular, to allow the opportunity for a range of future careers and possibilities.



FGHS STINGERS


