Students have now been notified of their elective allocations for 2020. If any student wishes to change, they may do so, however some courses are already at capacity.

Tell them from me Survey

This term, our school, like many other public schools in the state, will participate in a Department of Education initiative: the Tell Them From Me student feedback survey. The survey measures factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other student outcomes. The focus of the state wide survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices. You may remember that our students also participated in a Tell Them From Me student survey in Term 1 this year and also twice a year previously. Asking students to complete the survey twice in one year allows us to identify trends in student responses as well as track engagement and motivation across the school year. I want to assure you that the survey is confidential. The survey is conducted online and will typically take less than 30 minutes to complete. It will be administered during school hours between 26 August and 25 October. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary. If you do not want your child or children to participate, please contact the school.

Year 12 and the HSC

Students have just completed their Trial HSC Exams. Some might be shocked by their results and others celebrating success. Being a parent of a HSC student is not always easy. The following is a link to NSW Department of Education and some tips for parents:

Now is the last chance to really buckle down into some serious revision for students. Staff are providing comprehensive revision programs at school and this should be supplemented by consistent study at home. During the next holiday break many subjects will have sessions run with their teachers. Week 1 of Term 4 we see the start of the HSC with English Paper 1. During the 4 week HSC period staff will also be running extra "Preexam" revision sessions for one last opportunity to consolidate their knowledge. A timetable for both programs will be released soon and I would urge all students to use every available opportunity to connect with their teachers.

Year 11

Year 11 are completing the final stage of their courses. There will be an opportunity next term to possibly remove a course from their program of study. This would effectively allow them to have extra study periods. Students and parents need to be aware that subjects may not be removed from study in Term 4 unless all requirements of completion are met. That is, all tasks and course work is up to date.

Students will be invited to meet with the careers and transition advisor and the Deputy Principal to discuss any changes, being mindful of the impact this may have on students working towards an ATAR or achieving the HSC credential.

The step to HSC study is a big one and students should be maintaining a solid level of application across all courses no matter what their intention of continuing may be.

Selection Criteria:

Your application for this position should specifically address each of the selection criteria listed below and the work profile attached. Short listing and selection will be based upon responses to these selection criteria and the attached Duty Statement.

- SC 1 Demonstrated ability to empathise and work with students from Year 7 to Year 12.
- SC 2 Appropriate qualifications and/or demonstrated relevant experience.
- SC 3 Demonstrated high level of communication skills both oral and written and the ability to communicate effectively with a diverse range of people e.g. students, school principal, school staff, parents, Defence Members and their families.
- SC 4 Ability to liaise with a range of individuals and community groups. Demonstrated skills in advocacy and negotiations including problem solving and conflict resolution are essential
- SC 5 Demonstrated ability to organise own work, set priorities, meet deadlines, work independently and as a team member, and maintain confidentiality.
- SC 6 Ability to plan, organise, evaluate and deliver innovative and creative programs, resources and activities relating to mobile families, students and the school community.

However, with patience and perseverance, most managed the task and were very proud of their efforts.

SCIENCE

We have had a busy few weeks, with Science week having come and gone for another year. This year's theme was "Destination Moon" in celebration of the 50th anniversary of the moon landing. Mr Bromley conducted a Science Trivia competition, where students (and staff) were able to try and work out what a series of photos were that related to space and the moon. 
Well done to these award winners.

As a faculty, Science often gets dry ice and conducts experiments over the course of the week. This year, we went for something a little different. We got liquid Nitrogen instead. Nitrogen as a gas makes up 78% of the air we breathe. When it cools to -196°C, it becomes a liquid. Anything placed into this extremely cold liquid will be instantly snap frozen. You really don't want to put your hand in this stuff! We had a lot of fun demonstrating the science of liquid Nitrogen and trying to engage students with something they don't see every day.
